By the time you read this issue, the Executive Committee will have just completed its convention site review and final planning session for the 1986 Convention in the beautiful Hyatt Regency at Inner Harbor in Baltimore, MD. The hotel is one of the Hyatt showcases and has a very high occupancy rate; we urge you to register as soon as possible so that you will not be disappointed in your accommodations. If you like to browse in small shops for the unusual, if you like fresh seafood, if you like soft shell crabs in various forms, you will love the location and shops of the Inner Harbor marketplace.

Since many of you have never been to Baltimore or perhaps have not been there for a long time, there is a complete renovation to the downtown Baltimore area. The Seaquarium is one of the better ones in the country and there is the recently completed Six Flags Power Plant. For the first time, we are having an INDOCTRINATION SESSION for any one who is interested. It will include a series of presentations on many of the things we have developed over our existence including how and why we dance various moves the way we do. It will show and allow the participants to experience proper styling and timing with many of the key elements of previous conventions which we have emphasized. We will include a review of some of the key elements of how and why we got where we are today and what projects CALLERLAB is currently working on to include the very important Ad Hoc Committee which is reviewing the total dance program picture. This session will be on Sunday afternoon and it is purely voluntary in nature. It is designed principally for the Apprentices of CALLERLAB but will be valuable for callers of all experiences and qualifications.

Then on Sunday evening, we will again feature our very popular Social Hour with optional Cash Bars and non-alcoholic punch. It will be during this time that you will have an opportunity to meet each member of the Board by going through the receiving line (again not required). This will be an open forum for free interchange of ideas with the other callers and their partners in attendance. You are on your own for dinner on Sunday and Monday breakfast.

The official opening ceremonies will be conducted at 9:00 AM on Monday in the Convention Center, directly across the street from the Hyatt in Room 308 & 309 on the third floor meeting room level. Our Exhibitors will also be in the convention center on the same floor. We urge you to support the exhibitors who are making their products and services available for you to see, touch, try and/or listen to.

After a short break, the first session will feature a debate on the subject of Choreo-graphic Complexity and dancers' desires along this line. Sure to stir strong feelings in all who listen, although there is legitimate room for differences of opinion. Then we will break for lunch which is included in the convention package. All meals will be in the Hyatt Hotel in the Constellation Ballroom.

For the balance of the sessions (committee meetings, special meetings and interest sessions), check the detailed convention schedule to see if the meeting of your choice will be held in the convention center or the Hyatt hotel. Each of you will have to make choices on which sessions you will attend. If your partner is with you, we suggest that each of you attend a different session to broaden your exposure to all the convention has to offer.

The banquets on both Monday and Tuesday evenings are informal but sometimes some of our members and their partners do get a bit dressier. Western attire is always appropriate for the men but it need not be a suit. Casual clothes are equally appropriate at all times. Many of the callers attend meetings and dinners with short sleeved shirts or some will wear sweaters. For the ladies, square dance attire is not necessary since the convention is not primarily a dancing event. Some of you may want to have an outfit with you to take advantage of several dances in the local area just prior or subsequent to the CALLERLAB convention. Casual clothing is appropriate at all times. We do suggest, however, that you may wish to have a sweater with you since the air conditioning can be a little cool for some tastes. The walk from the hotel to the convention center is outdoors but is no more than perhaps a three or four minute walk.

The Wednesday morning session is for our general business meeting where all committee reports and any resolutions are presented for voting by the attendees. We remind you all to wear your convention badges for all sessions as well as meals. The hotel staff has been instructed not to permit anyone into any of the CALLERLAB areas without a CALLERLAB badge. If you are not wearing your badge at meal time, you will not be served. We guarantee to adjourn by noon Wednesday.

Title: VENUS and MARS, or TWO STARS IN THE NIGHT or COGWHEEL

References: Square Dances of the West and Southwest, Lee Owens, 1949.

Square Dancing for Intermediates, Bob Osgood & Jack Hoeheisal, 1949.

Square Your Sets, Marion & George Waudby, 1950.

Square Dancing Magazine, October 1982.

Burleson #728

Dance Description:

EIGHT TO THE CENTER FOR A RIGHT HAND STAR.

BACK BY THE LEFT BUT NOT TOO FAR,

All eight form a right hand star, then reverse and form a left hand star NOW THE FIRST LADY OUT AND FORM TWO STARS,

ONE LIKE VENUS AND ONE LIKE MARS,

With the #1 lady leading, the ladies drop off the big eight hand star and form a second right hand star, while the gents keep turning in a left hand star.

NOW THE LADIES MOVE IN AND THE GENTS MOVE OUT.

TURN THOSE TWO STARS ROUND ABOUT,

As the #1 lady finishes a turn of her new star, she extends her left hand and moves into the men's left hand star and joins it, as the first man crosses into the ladies' right hand star. The others follow one at a time at the same spot changing into new stars with the ladies crossing in front of the gents.

NOW THE LADIES MOVE OUT AND THE GENTS MOVE IN,

AND FORM THOSE TWO STARS ONCE AGAIN.

Change the stars again with #1 lady leading ahead of the #1 man.

TURN IT AROUND UNTIL YOU MEET YOUR OWN,

PICK HER UP AND STAR PROMENADE,

As #1 man comes adjacent to his partner, he picks her up in a star promenade followed by couples 4, 3 and 2. All promenade home.

The dance may be repeated three more times giving each lady a turn in leading out to form two stars. The dance makes a delightful change of pace for any dance and is received well by all dance levels. It also makes an excellent exhibition or demonstration dance.

John Marshall, Chairman of the CALLERLAB Advanced Quarterly Selection Committee, announced that the AQS Committee has selected SHUTTLE, written by Kip Garvey, as the newest selection for the quarter beginning December 1, 1985.

Definition:

SHUTTLE: From an Eight Chain Thru formation, all Pass Thru. New centers Slide Thru, while new outsides take a directional command of right, left, in or out.

Dance Examples:

Patter:

Heads Square Thru - SHUTTLE IN - Pass Thru - Wheel and Deal - Girls Pass Thru - SHUTTLE RIGHT - Bend the Line - 1 Square Thru - Right & Left Grand.

Singer:

Heads Right & Left Thru - Square Thru - Do Sa Do - SHUTTLE OUT - Ends Fold - Double Pass Thru - Track II - Swing - Promenade.

AMERICAN SQUAREDANCE MAGAZINE (ASD) of Ohio acquires circulation list of SQUARE DANCING (SIO) MAGAZINE of California --

Stan and Cathie Burdick of ASD are pleased to announce that negotiations with Bob and Becky Osgood of SIO have resulted in the Burdicks acquiring the rights to fulfill unexpired terms of all SIO subscribers after December 1985, when the latter magazine will cease publication. In addition, ASD will encourage present and recently expired SIO subscribers to sign up with ASD.

The transfer is the result of much planning before the contract was signed by the editors of both international magazines. It should be noted that the Osgoods have given a high endorsement to the Burdicks' magazine, commenting in the recent October issue as follows: "....if you already subscribe to ASD, you know what a fine publication it is Stan and Cathie Burdick, the co-editors of ASD, are dedicated to this activity and we have no hesitancy in putting you in their hands. The advertising of our products will appear monthly in the coming issues of ASD."

The change over event makes AMERICAN SQUAREDANCE, now in its fortieth publication year, the largest national/international magazine for the activity, with 30,000 issues to be mailed each month (90,000 readers), starting in January 1986.

SIO will have published its 444th and final issue in December 1985 after a period of 37 years. Bob Osgood has been the editor for the entire period. Although the Osgoods are retiring from the magazine work, they will plan to continue many other programs and services, such as manual and handbook publication, Asilomar Institutes, the Hall of Fame, The Silver Spur and seminar/clinic presentations.

CALLERS WORKING TOGETHER

During these times, when Square Dancing seems to be facing a number of challenges, we need as many interested people working together as we can get. To that end, CALLERLAB, The International Association of Square Dance Callers, continues to seek and encourage callers to become members, subscribers or apprentices and to work with their peers for the betterment of Square Dancing.

Full membership in CALLERLAB requires that a caller attend an annual convention. For some callers, because of their jobs or other good reasons, attendance at the convention is not possible at the time they become eligible for membership. for these callers that the SUBSCRIBER category of affiliation was established. SUBSCRIBERS must meet the same eligibility requirements as full members but do not have to attend a convention. When they do attend their first convention, they automatically become full members, provided their dues are paid. **SUBSCRIBERS** receive CALLERLAB publication and liability insurance.

Some newer callers who want to be a part of CALLERLAB do not yet meet the prerequisite of having called an average of fifty (50) dances per year for the three (3) years prior to application that is required for the full member and subscriber. Recognizing the need to open the doors to these newer callers, CALLERLAB established the CALLERLAB APPRENTICE Program in 1985. APPRENTICES receive CALL-ERLAB publications and may attend the annual CALLERLAB convention, where a special pre-convention educational program will be available to them. the liability insurance; however, they may not serve on committees nor are they permitted to vote.

CALLERLAB suggests that dancers may want to encourage their caller to become affiliated with CALLERLAB in a category that meets his or her needs. CALLERLAB's message for its members is, "Recruit! Recruit! Recruit!". How many subscribers or apprentices have you signed up lately? CALLERLAB also takes this opportunity to remind its members that recruiting is much more effective when the recruiter presents a good example of what the organization stands for.

"A quarterly selection has a life of six months. After six months of usage, the selection will be voted upon for a continued six month period. For the Mainstream and Plus quarterly selections, the entire membership will have the opportunity to vote. The Advanced QS will only be voted upon by members of the Advanced Committee."

The calls on this list were selected by vote of the members of the CALLERLAB Advanced Dancing Committee comprised of over 220 callers throughout the country, and have been approved by CALLERLAB.

In an Advanced Dancing program dancers are expected to understand the Mainstream, Plus, and Advanced calls from most, but not necessarily all, formations, positions, and arrangements. Dancers are also expected to understand the concept of calls they dance.

CALLERLAB

TEACHING ORDER FOR THE A-1 and A-2 BASIC CALLS LISTS

In September of 1983, the Advanced Dancing Program was divided into two separate segments, A-1 and A-2. These two designations define two distinct programs of dancing within the Advanced program. Callers should teach all the basics contained in the A-1 program before going on to the A-2 program. Dances advertised as A-1 should utilize only the Mainstream, Plus, and A-1 calls. If the caller decides to use Quarterly Selections or other calls, he should plan on workshopping those calls. These calls are listed in the recommended teaching order.
