FROM THE CHAIR

would like to congratulate our newly elected members of the Board of Governors. Our Board now consists of callers from nineteen different states, Canada and Germany. I'm pleased that we have such a balance of callers from all phases of the activity. Enclosed with this issue of DIRECTION is an invitation to our convention in Vancouver, British Columbia, on April 11–13, 1994. This is our first convention to be held outside the United States, and it's scheduled a full week after Easter. This may be helpful to some callers that have had scheduling conflicts with previous conventions.

The Executive Committee, with input from last year's critique sheets and comments from members this year, has planned an excellent program. There will be interest sessions, demonstration sessions and committee meetings, as well as sessions offering an opportunity to discuss specific problems in our activity and their solutions. We are excited about the convention facilities at the Hyatt Regency. Plan now to attend. Sharing your knowledge and learning from others is a great way to charge your batteries and increase the enthusiasm in your calling activities.

The Survey of Quarterlies and Emphasis Calls has been tallied at the Home Office. The results have gone out to the Board and all Program and QS Committee Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen for their review and comment. One thing is very evident; many callers use the chosen material. Although modifications may be made, it is clear that callers are using this material to add variety to their programs and these selections are being presented simultaneously all over the world. This in turn, decreases the volume of new material that dancers are exposed to in any given year. The beauty of these Quarterlies is that they are entirely optional, used only at a callers discretion and dancers are not required to remember these selections.

As most of you know, from the last issue of

DIRECTION, the Executive Committee, with input from the Research and Development Committee and a professional market research firm, sent out a questionnaire to a random sampling of CALLERLAB members all over the world. We wanted the opinions of our members regarding various aspects of square dancing and the CALLERLAB dance programs. The results have been professionally tabulated and we have just received them as I write this. I know you are all eager to know what we've learned. The following is an attempt to identify the most obvious messages.

The strongest support of all (97%) was voted for the statement that it is important to have square dance programs that are the same world wide, allowing dancers away from their "home" know what to expect. Nearly as strong (95%) was the support for the statement that it is important to be able to teach new dancers to dance successfully in one class season. Although most callers voiced overall satisfaction with square dancing and program structure, there was definite dissatisfaction with the size of our classes.

When asked for preference about changes, no changes, and/or combining CALLERLAB programs, the percentages were extremely close and varied, based on the geographic location of the caller, and the entry program taught for new dancers. There was not a majority of callers supporting our current policy of working toward equalizing the number of calls on the programs.

The Executive Committee is analyzing the data in detail and will be meeting this month to make recommendations to the Board of Governors for action. We appreciate the high level of response to this important survey and realize that this response rate indicates how strongly you feel about the issues contained in this questionnaire.

I'd like to conclude with a verse that can speak to a part of each one of us.

Watch your thoughts; they become words. Watch your words; they become actions,

Watch your actions; they become habits.
Watch your habits; they become character.
Watch your character; it becomes your destiny.

PLUS COMMENTARY

he biennial review of the Plus Program has been completed by the Plus Committee. The process included a questionnaire sent to committee members in February 1993 requesting suggestions for calls to be added to, or dropped from, the Plus Program. Calls on all CALLERLAB programs were eligible for consideration for addition to the Plus Program.

Following completion of the Mainstream Program review, a ballot was prepared based on the responses received to the February questionnaire and sent to committee members in August 1993. All calls receiving at least 10% of the response to the February questionnaire were placed on the ballot for a final vote by the committee membership. In addition, two calls dropped from the Mainstream Program (Cross Trail Thru and Partner Tag) were placed on the ballot for consideration for addition to the Plus Program. (Left Turn Thru, which was also voted to be dropped from the Mainstream Program, was not placed on the ballot since it can be called directionally.)

90% of the Plus Committee members responded to the ballot, representing callers from U.S., Canada, Europe, Australia and New Zealand.

Based on the results of the voting by the committee members, the Plus Committee recommends adding three calls; Cut the Diamond, Acey Deucey and Partner Tag, to the Plus Program. The first two calls are currently part of the A1 Program. The third, Partner Tag, was dropped from the Mainstream Program as a result of the recent review of that program. The Plus Committee recommends dropping one call, Triple Trade, from the Plus Program.

The Plus Committee hereby submits the following resolution to be placed before the voting membership of CALLERLAB:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the calls Cut the Diamond, Acey Deucey and Partner Tag be added to the Plus Program and the call Triple Trade be dropped from the Plus Program.

Voting members of CALLERLAB will find a ballot containing this resolution in this issue of *DIRECTION*. We urge you to exercise your right to vote on this important issue.

This theme, and several others suggested by CALLERLAB members, were considered by the Executive Committee. 'REACH OUT AND TEACH SOMEONE' was suggested by Keith Rippeto of Parkersburg, West Virginia. Keith will receive his 1994/95 dues as a token payment for his efforts in helping to set the tone and direction of the 1994 convention.

74% of a recent statistical survey of our membership believed that the prime reason for poor dancing is lack of proper teaching. An important observation by many callers is that new dancers learn best when the material is presented with skill, judgement and an assurance of dancer success.

The 1994 Convention Program will include several sessions in support of these observations.

In addition to the sessions which are focused directly on our theme, the convention program will include other sessions which are certainly related to the idea of dancers having a more satisfying experience. Consider, for instance, the session on Degree of Difficulty in Choreography and the Monday night Line/Solo Dance party.

Those who attend this year's convention may also be involved in the work of several of CALLERLAB's standing committees. The Accreditation Committee, Education Committee and Choreographic Applications Committee are working on projects that need your input. A newly-formed ad-hoc committee is working on a 'Teaching Techniques' manual and video tape. An adhoc Membership Committee will be considering changes to the membership requirements and to the by-laws. Changes proposed by these committees will certainly have an impact on the teaching of square dancing for many years to come. We urge all of you to join in the spirit of this convention theme. Take part, contribute and learn from others while we work together to make square dancing even more fun for everyone. Complete details are included with this issue of DIRECTION.

SOUND ENHANCEMENT FREQUENCY

ert Swerer, of Hilton Audio Products, cautions users of sound enhancement equipment that they should <u>not</u> order new or additional equipment by specifying Channel 5 or Channel I. Instead, be sure you specify the frequency of the equipment you are ordering.

CALLERLAB has recommended 72.9mHZ as the primary frequency or 72.1mHZ as the secondary frequency, for equipment used in square dance halls.

Ordering equipment by specifying channel 5 or channel I could result in obtaining narrow band equipment which is not compatible with broad band systems currently in use.

QUARTERLY SELECTIONS: TO USE OR NOT TO USE?

erhaps you've been there —
A caller (you) starts a dance (or takes a break)
and a dancer comes up to them, sounding
somewhat peeved and says, "I was at (traveling
caller's) or (local caller's) dance last Monday and
he/she called the latest Quarterly Selection. YOU
hadn't taught it to us and I was SO embarrassed!"

Is the caller uncomfortable? Probably. Does s/he feel guilty? Possibly. Should s/he? NO!

I have heard of callers around the country who teach the latest Quarterly Selection while stating how terrible it is and bemoaning the fact (?) that CALLERLAB <u>makes</u> them use this material. I have often felt that this was their defense and/or solution to having been caught in the above (very uncomfortable) situation. Or perhaps they aren't as ancient (in the square dance world) as I am and really believe they should prepare their dancers to do the Quarterlies if other callers want to use them. Perhaps callers haven't sat through as many discussions as I have or they are trying hard to do their best for the dancers and somehow they missed the point that Quarterlies are OPTIONAL WORKSHOP material.

Maybe some callers are afraid that if they explain that it's optional to use a Quarterly Selection for a workshop, some dancers will think poorly of them. ("Ah Ha - _____hasn't done their homework".) So they pass the responsibility on to CALLERLAB and get out of the dilemma.

Callers, you are doing a disservice to yourself, CALLERLAB and your dancers, if you use any Quarterly Selection against your better judgement!! You are sacrificing your belief in your judgement. You may be demeaning CALLERLAB, which, although it has flaws, deserves respect for the work it is trying to do. And you are subjecting your dancers to a workshop which is unnecessary and not fun. Workshops can only be fun if the caller sells the material. You can't sell material in which you do not believe. Why workshop at every open dance anyway? (But that's another whole article.)

SO, what does the poor caller in our original soap opera story line DO? They can say, "I am SO sorry you felt embarrassed by (local caller) or (travelling caller), using the Quarterly when you didn't know it! I did do you a disservice, BECAUSE I didn't make it clear to you that you aren't supposed to know Quarterlies - they are always supposed to be workshopped. If this happens again, don't be shy about reminding the caller that they should be workshopping (even if it's the down and dirty 'quickteach') any Quarterly Selection before calling it at an open dance. I am SO glad you brought this to my attention, so I could clarify where Quarterlies belong in the square dance picture. Let's get back to dancing and our fun evening now!" The dancer should feel better, no one blames CALLERLAB (hopefully), and no caller has to teach a Quarterly Selection that they dislike.

<u>REMEMBER</u> – only you can prevent Quarterly misuse (or Forest Fires).



QUALITY VS QUANTITY

'm intrigued by the questions and conclusions expressed by Bill Davis in his Circle Right article, August, 1993. He asks, "Is it better to be able to dance all the Mainstream calls from all the allowed arrangements and formations or to be able to dance the

high frequency Plus and Mainstream calls from only the so-called standard set-up?" He states that, "The answer is tied to the concept of mobility." He concludes that, "Clearly, neither course is better than the other."

He is discussing the age-old questions of quality vs. quantity. Is it better to learn a little bit about a lot of calls or a lot about a few calls? He is comparing two different program possibilities; one in which new dancers learn a little about each of the 95 calls in the Plus Program during one-120 hour instruction package (60 two hour classes) and one in which new dancers learn 67 Mainstream calls in 60 hours (30 two hour classes) and then continue to dance Mainstream for another 60 hours or longer without learning any Plus calls.

In the real world of square dancing the choice is not just a clear cut decision between two possible approaches. Even the amount of class time is not a simple choice between two different ways to spend a number of hours. For example, the change in the recommendation for CALLERLAB Mainstream instruction of 41 sessions to 60 hours, came after we found that many clubs taught their new dancer classes on their club dance night. They taught the class for one hour to one and a half hours then the club danced their regular program. Even if classes were run for 41 weeks, many new dancers were getting much less than 60 hours of instruction. This change was to encourage everyone to spend at least 60 hours teaching the Mainstream calls.

CALLERLAB has always recommended that new dancers learn the calls in the Basic or Mainstream Programs then dance them for a year before taking lessons to learn calls in any other program. It is very clear to all teachers that there is no magic amount of time (60 hours) in which every new dancer can learn the calls in any given program equally well.

Unfortunately, our real world classes in U.S. often do not follow the suggestion that new dancers receive 60 hours of instruction to learn the 67 Mainstream calls! Many classes are spending only slightly more than that teaching the 95 calls in the Plus Program.

Is there a difference, other than mobility, between 1) teaching the Mainstream Program in 60 hours and dancing it for another 60 hours or longer and 2) teaching the Mainstream Program in 60 hours followed immediately by teaching the Plus calls in another 60 hours? From a teacher's standpoint, yes.

The additional learning that goes on in a follow-up Mainstream Program is learning interesting variations of calls already well learned. It is easy for skilled dancers to learn call variations such as Walk and Dodge from facing lines of four or 2 Ladies Chain 3/4

or Left Swing Thru. Most skillful Basic and Mainstream callers teach these variations while calling. They simply use helpful directions while the dancers are moving.

Learning new Plus calls is a very different learning experience. Most Plus calls are not variations of calls the dancer knows well, they are unique combinations of several different calls. These tightly choreographed, complex call patterns must be memorized by the dancer. When the caller says, Spin Chain the Gears, Relay the Deucey, Tea Cup Chain, Coordinate, or Spin Chain and Exchange the Gears, he or she has done his or her part. It is now up to the dancer to recall all the parts of the figure and dance them in proper sequence and with correct timing.

It is a very different learning experience for the new dancer who, instead of learning some interesting variations of known calls, spends the same amount of time trying to learn 23 complex new calls added to the 67 calls just taught. Which experience to choose is a judgment call, but the decision involves much more than mobility.

Actually, there is a third possibility that should be considered. Follow the Mainstream class with a good Round Dance class. There is evidence which suggests the largest square dance clubs include both square and round dancing. I'm convinced most dancers who stay in their clubs the longest dance both squares and rounds. Many fine programs in our Mainstream states such as Oregon and Washington, and in other countries, including Canada, teach Mainstream and rounds to their new dancers. Doubly interesting is that many of these programs are very healthy and even growing!

It is true that making such choices is very subjective and depends on many considerations. We, as caller and dancer leaders, should truly offer our new dancers a real choice between an enriched Mainstream Program (quality) and a standard Plus Program (quantity). We need to be sure that both programs are available in every community so our new dancers truly have the opportunity to choose.

BUT WHAT DO THEY STAND FOR.....?

Are our programs too difficult - too long - too short - too many??

What is wrong with our recruiting??

Do all countries have the same problems - shouldn't we be offering different solutions for different countries?

Would we get better participation if we had area conventions, thereby shortening the travel time/expense and reducing the size of the host facility, cutting expense even more? Maybe these area conventions could elect their own representatives and *these* would make up the Board of Governors.

Popularity should not decide the leaders of our organization. Accurate representation of the members should be the deciding factor.

This can never be achieved until the members know how the candidates stand on the issues of the day.

It's too late to do anything this year, but I'd sure like to know how other members feel on this subject.

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

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START



PLUS EMPHASIS CALL

Larry Davenport, Chairman of the Plus Committee, is pleased to announce that DIXIE GRAND has been selected as the Plus Emphasis Call for the period beginning November 1, 1993. (Standard formation, arrangement and comment are provided from the CALLERLAB "Standard Plus Applications" document.)

DIXIE GRAND

STANDARD STARTING

FORMATION:

(Starting) Double Pass Thru

ARRANGEMENT:

"O" (Normal couples)

COMMENT:

Cue words "right, left, right" will increase success from

other formations.

DEFINITION

Starting formation - Dixie Grand Circle, Double Pass Thru, Quarter Tag, or any formation where at least two dancers can start.

Those who can start the call by joining right hands with the facing dancer and pulling by. Each dancer moves ahead around the circle and gives a left hand to the next, pulling by and a right hand to the next, pulling by. Regardless of the starting formation, as the movement progresses, the formation converts to a circle.

STYLING: DIXIE GRAND - Styling is similar to the description for the basic right and left grand. Dancers use handshake hold for alternating pull by movements, releasing hands as dancers pass each other. Skirt work is not recommended.

ENDING FORMATION:

Circle

DANCE EXAMPLEZ:

(from Static Square) 4 Ladies Chain 3/4, 4 Ladies Chain, Circle Left, Allemande Left, Allemande Thar, Remake the Thar, Shoot the Star, DIXIE GRAND, Turn Partner Left (full turn), Promenade (uses Dixie Grand Circle)

ALLEMANDE LEFT GETOUT:

(from zero box) Dosado*, Right and Left Thru, Veer Left, Couples Circulate, Ferris Wheel, DIXIE GRAND, Allemande Left (uses starting Double Pass Thru) (from Zero Box) Dosado*, Swing Thru, Boys Run, Couples Circulate, Ferris Wheel and Spread, Slide Thru, Square Thru, (on the third hand) DIXIE GRAND, Allemande Left (uses starting Double Pass Thru)

* Use a Dosado as needed for correct hand availability for the next call.

RIGHT AND LEFT GRAND:

(from Zero Line) Slide Thru, Pass Thru, Trade By, Slide Thru, Pass Thru, Bend the Line, Left Touch a Quarter, Boys Run, DIXIE GRAND, (on the third hand) Right and Left Grand (uses Eight Chain Thru, 1/2 Arrangement (Half-Sashayed couples))

SINGING CALL EXAMPLE:

(from Static Square) Sides Right and Left Thru, Flutterwheel, Heads Right and Left Thru, Pass the Ocean, Girls Trade, DIXIE GRAND, Allemande Left (full turn), (Keep Her and) Promenade (uses Quarter Tag)

TIMING:

6 Beats

CONNECT THE DIAMOND

STARTING FORMATION:

Right Hand or Left Hand Diamonds

DEFINITION:

Points Cross Fold, Centers Single Hinge and Extend.

ENDING FORMATION:

Box Circulate Formation.

DANCE EXAMPLE:

Heads Lead Right, Veer Left, Ladies Hinge, Diamond Circulate, CONNECT THE DIAMOND, Men Run, Swing

Thru, Right and Left Grand.

Heads Square Thru, Swing Thru, Men Run, Couples Circulate, Ladies Single Hinge, Diamond Circulate, CONNECT THE DIAMOND, Circulate, Trade and Roll,

Crosstrail, Left Allemande.

SINGING CALL:

Heads Promenade 1/2, Lead Right, Right and Left Thru, Veer Left, Ladies Single Hinge, CONNECT THE DIAMOND, Ladies Run, Box the Gnat, Square Thru 3/4,

Swing, promenade.

TIMING:

4 beats.

DUMBARTON DRUMS

THE CONTRA OF THE QUARTER for November 1, 1993 - March 1, 1994

FORMATION: Lines of Four facing lines of Four. This is called a Mescolanza Formation and is easy to form from a square by having the Sides lead Right and Circle 4 to a Line. Align the lines so that when they Pass thru they will be facing a new line ready to start the dance over again. Minimum lines of four would be 3, but 5 or more is recommended.

MUSIC: Shaw 172 or a well phrased 64 - beat hornpipe.

INTRO ---, With the music Forward and Back

All take 3 short steps forward, then Bow to the person they face on the fourth step. Back up 4 steps.

1-8 ---, Right couple in front Sashay Over

Each half of the line will exchange places with the other using 6 "side-Skip" steps and then stamp 3 times lightly in place on beats 7 and 8. This is a Couples Half Sashay.

9-16 ---, With the music Forward and Back

Same as "intro" above.

17-24 ---, Right couple in front Sashay Back

Same as 1-8 above except there is a New Right Hand Couple.

25-32 ---, With the opposites Right Hand Star

With the couple across from you make a 4 handed Right Hand Star

- 33-40 --- Same four Left Hand Star
- 41-48 --- , Back to lines then Forward and Back
- 49-56 ---, Arch to the Head Dive to the Foot

Each half of each line facing the head of the hall (facing the caller), makes an Arch with the near hands joined. Each half of each line facing the bottom of the hall (backs to the caller), will join near hands and Dive thru the Arch to meet a new line of four to begin the dance all over again.

First Couple Right and Circle Four Hands 'Round

(First couple without swinging leads to the couple on the right and circle four.)

Pick Up Two and Make It Six Hands 'Round

(Number 1 man breaks, takes the hand of Number 3 lady while her partner, Number 3 man, takes the hand of Number 2 lady and circles six.)

Pick Up Two and Make It Eight Hands 'Round

There'll Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight

(Number 1 man breaks circle as he comes around and picks up lady Number 4. Her partner joins hands with lady Number 3 and circle eight hands to the left.)

Allemande Left with the Lady on Your Left

Allemande Right with the Lady on Your Right

(Pass your partner by the right shoulder (ladies going on the outside, men on the inside of the circle) going to the original right hand lady and do a right allemande)

Allemande Left with the Lady on Your Left

(Pass your partner by the left shoulder (men on the inside of the circle again) going to your original corner with your left hand and do a regular left allemande.

And a Grand Right and Left All Around, My Baby

Meet Your Honey and Do a Do-Sa-Do

Take That Baby in Your Arms, 'Round and Around you Go (Regular waist swing.)

Now Promenade Around With the Sweetest Girl in Town

There'll Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight

(Turn your partner under your arm after the swing and promenade her back to your original home spot, turn her under your arm, balance away and face the center of the square.)

(Repeat this three more times to get each couple as the active unit.)
