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RESULTS OF PROGRAM POLICY CHANGE VOTE

he 2006 CALLERLAB Call to Convention in the January/February 2006 issue of DIREC-TION announced that a MOTION to revise the Program Policy dated January 4, 2000 (Revised July 15, 2004) would be presented, discussed, and voted on during the 2006 Annual CALLERLAB meeting. The MOTION was to add a dance program called Basic to the list of CALLERLAB dance programs in the Program Policy. The current Program Policy, as revised July 15, 2004, was provided to all members in the July/August 2004 issue of DIRECTION. The MOTION to revise the Program Policy was presented to the membership during the CALLERLAB Annual Business Meeting April 12, 2006 for discussion and vote. The MOTION provided in the Call To Convention was amended during the meeting.

During the 2006 CALLERLAB Annual Business Meeting the amended motion, printed below, was approved by the membership. All voting members will receive a ballot to vote on this issue.

The change approved by the Membership during the 2006 CALLERLAB meeting adds a dance program called Basic to the CALLERLAB dance programs. If this MOTION is not rescinded by the Voting Members, this Basic program will consist of the first 53 calls on the Mainstream list as of the date the MOTION receives final approval by the CALLERLAB Membership. The following AMENDED MOTION was approved during the 2006 Annual Membership meeting:

Be It Resolved That: The CALLERLAB Board Of Governors Program Policy, as revised on July 15, 2004 be revised as follows:

Paragraph 2 be changed to read:

2. Dance programs are listed in the order dancers learn them. Currently, the CALLERLAB dance programs and their respective abbreviations are:

a. Basic - B

 $b.\ Mainstream - MS$

c. Plus - PL

d. Advanced 1 - A-1

e. Advanced 2 - A- 2

f. Challenge 1 - C-1

g. Challenge 2 - C-2

h. Challenge 3A - C-3A

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Paragraph 6 be changed to read:

6. A CALLERLAB Standing Committee manages one or more dance programs. Currently, the dance programs are managed by the following committees:

a. Mainstream Committee - B and MS

b. Plus Committee - PL

c. Advanced Committee - A-1 and A-2

d. Challenge Committee - C-1, C-2 and C-3A

The remainder of the Board Of Governors Program Policy Statement as revised on July 15, 2004 remains unchanged.

The Basic Program shall be initially defined as the first 53 calls on the Mainstream list as of the date this motion is adopted. After that, the program shall be managed by the Mainstream Committee

Eligible Members are provided a ballot asking whether this motion should be rescinded. Ballots <u>Must</u> be returned to the CALLERLAB Office no later than July 15, 2006. The Bylaws require that at least one third of the ballots MUST be returned AND at least two thirds of the ballots returned vote to rescind the MOTION as approved during the Annual Meeting, or the action taken at the meeting stands approved and is binding on the organization.

CHAIRMAN'S SPEECH Tim Crawford, Outgoing Chairman

ell it's good bye for me. After two wickedly fast years as your Chairman, tomorrow will be the last swing of the gavel! At the conclusion of the general meeting tomorrow, your new Chairman, the other Tim, Mr. **Tim Marriner**, will assume the roll of Chairman of the Board. The chairman's office lends a very unique position from where to view the workings of the Organization, the people that make up the organization, and the wild amounts of effort and passion that

make this organization work.

From the Chair, you see and hear things you might not otherwise see and hear. Those "things" are both satisfying, and disturbing. Some of the points of view are beyond comprehension, actions unfathomable and accomplishments amazing. You get to see how incredibly hard **Jerry Reed** and the whole Home Office staff work for so little pay, and sometimes so little personal reward. They are to be commended, and I am not seeking cheap praise for them. I merely state fact.

Lately, when I meet colleagues on the stage, or on the dance floor, I get the same question over and over when they learn that my term is up. They ask me if I am happy with the "progress" of CALLERLAB over the last two years, or if I am satisfied with the accomplishments of CALLERLAB in the last two years. Progress and accomplishments to me are dramatically different, and I view them exactly that way. Dramatically different. To say I am proud of the accomplishments would be a very true statement, yet to say I am pleased with our progress would probably be an un-truth, because I am not pleased with our progress.

Accomplishments. Webster's says this:

- 1. the act of <u>accomplishing</u>: **COMPLETION** 2: something that has been <u>accomplished</u>:
- **2.** ACHIEVEMENT **3 a**: a quality or ability equipping one for society **b**: a special skill or ability acquired by training or practice

The committees of CALLERLAB are pretty much the "accomplishers" here. They churn out work, create policy, procedure, stature, professional standards, documents that further our craft, avenues through which all members can contribute, they teach, they learn, they create a knowledgebase of experience, they do what needs to be done and they $\underline{A} \ \underline{R} \ \underline{E}$ CALLERLAB. It's not the Chair, the EC, the BOG . . . the committee's.

Through their "quality or ability equipping one for society and a special skill or ability acquired by training or practice" they form a solid professional platform for the organization even though the organization is not a recognized professional association. The years of committee work have set standards higher than some other

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"professional" organization that I belong to. We should be proud of that accomplishment.

Other accomplishments include, but certainly are not limited to,

- 1) Callers partners are now eligible to serve on some committees a recognition of an obvious ability to contribute
- 2) The review by the Grant writing committee of a grant request by the ARTS . . . we have the expertise and the history behind us to intelligently comment on the endeavour.
- 3) Handicapable committee is spearheading a database, and working to develop a program of calls.
- 4) The Multi-cycle and Committee for Community and Traditional Dance (CCTD) committees have gained widespread use.
- 5) **Tom Rudebock**, through his frustration, kept at his task until it was done. The Add A Buck campaign has been adopted by the ARTS . . . I for one am proud of Tom's accomplishment
- 6) The WIC paper, the best of CALLERLAB series, the Calling In Schools Handbook, the MS definitions rewrite, the dancer demographic survey, the Foundation fundraising efforts were a hit (you remember the bat?)

I think the single most important accomplishment is the PPI, the Program Policy Initiative. It's an initiative that encourages "bold experimentation", and provides a place for you to tell us about it, and a place where we can watch, and look for answers. But of course you already knew that....right? I still believe that The PPI is the best chance we have to find a solution . . . it is a way that we can "look" for an answer . . . because if we are not looking for an answer, we'll never find it.

Accomplishment is not our problem . . . progress is. Progress: Websters says this:

a forward or onward movement (as to an objective or to a goal): **ADVANCE** gradual betterment; such as: the progressive development of mankind

While we can literally count the accomplishments, and bank on more, I am frustrated by our progress . . our forward or onward movement. I am frustrated <u>not</u> by our lack of ability to "turn the ship" and point it in a new changed DIRECTION, but our seeming inability to move the ship forward after we've pointed it that way. I do not believe we have a changed way of thinking yet in CALLERLAB, just a "desire" to have a changed way of thinking.

There are a few things we're sure of . . . that what we are currently doing at our programs does not attract new people, that if we don't find a solution we can count on the demise of Dosado, that we must change to survive, and that it must be a leadership organization that takes charge of the change. Having said that, it becomes clear that CALLERLAB can and should be working toward solving each of those known things. So why can't we get there? How did we get to the point of

treading water, especially when we are accomplishing so much. What drives us to vote away a program and find ourselves in only a few years, reconsidering it? What drives us to drop calls, and at the next Triennial Review put them back on the ballot to be added again?

Is it recognition of a mistake, and the reversal is the correction? Is it that each vote is done by a different group of members with differing viewpoints and alternate attitudes? Is it because times changed back to before we made the change? I don't know what the answer is. But I do know that the answer lies within each of us . . . in our attitudes and our vision.

Last year I spoke about change, and how we need to be seeking an answer by means of experimentation, and I still want to send that message to you. Each and every one of my "from the chair" articles tried to hammer home the idea of experimentation and communication of results both good and bad. Last year I gave you a lot of "what-if's"... you might recall I said

"What if one of you applied a new technique of recruiting based on some premise of the dance form that is far beyond the current model . . . say and it was so successful, that you were able to populate not only your group, but others as well. What if this new paradigm was fast becoming the norm across many regions? Ask yourself, would I be in a position to change?

What if a successful new model had elements like:

 $no\ requirement\ for\ dress\ code$

beer was now part of the dance

 $spandex\ is\ now\ widely\ accepted\ as\ attire$

a new program of ten weeks of dancing included the call relay the deucy

every dance was corporately sponsored and attendees had to endure commercials

dancing was now an outdoor activity only

 $competition\ was\ the\ norm\ and\ clubs\ were\ competitors$ $for\ some\ CALLER LAB\ award$

suppose the most successful approach was "no change"

Ask yourself, would I be in a position to change my thinking?

Do you care about the survival of Square Dancing, or do you care about the survival of your square Dancing?

That was last years "what if's." The past year, with the aid of some education, some scholars and the insight of some people whose opinions I trust, I tried to make some observations, that would help me to understand my frustration in our progress.

Again, I do know that the answer lies within each of us in our attitudes and our vision. So I looked introspectively to try to come to grips with what impedes our progress. In business school I learned a couple of "sins" that come in handy now and then . . .

- The first deadly sin of a successful firm: arrogance
- 2) the second deadly sin: a resistance to change

Is it possible that CALLERLAB has become arrogant

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in our stance. After all, we have been very successful in standardizing the activity. This is something we should be forever proud, and we should forever want this to be the way. But in that success, is it possible that we've subconsciously decided that we're not going to change because we have always been "the way". CALLERLAB Programs revolutionized modern western square dancing. I mean, ask yourself... do you really think we need to change? Can we change? It might involve a completely new attitude... an attitude adjustment... that we just might not be "the way", having to set our arrogance aside... could we?

The second deadly sin is a resistance to change. I see signs of this, but I don't know where we are in our thinking with change. I hear people talking about change all the time, but there seems to be constant resistance to any change that is made, sometimes by members within, sometimes by dancers. We react to those changes like a responsible organization should, and often the outcome of that reaction is reversal. So clearly either we have had second thoughts about the change we made initially, or there is a resistance to change.

If both of these sins are considered deadly, and we might have signs of these sins in our thinking, then we really need to sit down and take a closer look at our own attitudes and positions. Perhaps I am way off base . . . maybe not . . .bottom line is I really don't know how you feel . . . but you do. I want you to really examine yourselves . . . do you have a vision for the future? Have you thought about change? Could you??

Who said "I have seen the enemy, and he is us". Could we be our problem? Is it possible that we are in the way of the very thing we are trying to do? In spite of all our criticisms, I firmly believe we are on a positive path, and that with the continued accomplishments of CALLER-LAB, and a good heart-to-heart about our own mindset, that we are destined to find the way.

To this day I will never be able to express to you my feelings when I was elected to chair. I remain humbled, and I thank you for putting faith in this young Canadian, to do my part for an organization and an activity that I love so much. I will forever believe that it is CALLERLAB that will lead the way . . . it simply must . . .

hat a great convention! We certainly hope that you have enjoyed it. For some of you this was your first convention, for others this has become an annual event. We must provide the necessary guidance to steer these failing groups in a new direction. Search out new methods of recruitment and teaching and get back to some form of dancing. We must take a proactive leadership role starting within our own area.

On a larger scale CALLERLAB is only as effective as its members. Get involved and be a part of the solution. Don't stand outside and throw rocks at everyone else. Let's start attacking the problems and not each other. Some want success only if it comes in the form of their package. We have to set aside our personal agendas, selfish goals and egos to work collectively seeking answers to raise the tide for the entire activity, not just one or two boats. Let's work together as a team to find some positive answers. We can make a positive difference: individually within our area, as a group within committees, and collectively as an organization. We can make this a year of progress.

MILESTONE PRESENTATION

he Milestone Award is the highest honor given to an individual by CALLERLAB. This year in Charlotte there were two honorees;

Calvin Campbell and Betsy Gotta. The award speech for each follows.

MILESTONE AWARD CALVIN CAMPBELL Presented by Jim Mayo

am pleased to have the privilege of presenting CALLERLAB's most prestigious award this evening.

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The recipient is a man with such unique qualities that it will be impossible to keep his identity hidden from most of you for very long. Nevertheless, I will keep his name to myself for a while as I list those unique qualities and remind you of his contributions to square dancing.

This gentleman was born and brought up as a child on the western slopes of the Rocky Mountains. He learned to square dance in the fourth grade. I'm not sure whether it was because he didn't play an instrument but he did get to lead the band as the drum major in high school. He set off to college in the 1950's at Colorado A&M in Fort Collins and there he discovered that the college square dance club offered, in addition to lessons in square dancing, the opportunity to meet girls. Fortunately, even though one of the girls he met there was to become his wife, the encounters with girls did not distract him from an interest in calling. Soon after he learned to dance, like many of us, he thought it might be fun to try calling. As he said in a letter to me that I have quoted in my book about the history of modern square dancing:

I started learning to become a caller in the fall of 1955. I picked up one record for patter and picked a dance from *Sets in Order Five Years Of Dancing* and memorized it. I also did the same with a singing call. This was the accepted method of learning to call and you didn't stray very far from the routines published in the books.

Those were the early days of Modern Western Square Dancing and that was also very close to where the transition from traditional square dancing began. Our recipient became part of that transition and called for square dance clubs in Texas and New Mexico while pursuing his career working for the US Dept. Of Agriculture as a veterinarian.

At the same time he never lost interest in the traditional heritage from which we came. He and his wife were founding members and have long been active supporters of the Lloyd Shaw Foundation.

In 1974, when CALLERLAB invited about one hundred of the most prominent callers in the US to attend our first convention, our recipient was there. His involvement with CALLERLAB was interrupted for a few years but, since his return in 1991, he has been a strong and vocal advocate for a particular phase of square dancing. He has worked to promote the new dancer party. Five years ago that activity was viewed with some disdain by many, if not most, modern western callers. Some thought of it as an activity for those who lacked the skill to call for a club. Others viewed it as a waste of time since it seemed not to be effective in recruiting people into square dance class. Few thought of the party dance as an important part of our modern activity.

Our Milestone recipient had a different view. A view that, at the time, was certainly in an "uncharted field." He believed that our square dance recreation should be made available in a form that would allow folks to participate without committing their entire recreational life to it. He was vice-chairman of what was to become the Community Dance Committee, then chaired by **Ken Kernan**. Under their guidance the contra, traditional and easy rounds and mixer parts of square dancing were combined into what we called the Community Dance Program.

By now most of you know that I am describing Cal Campbell. He has worked hard at making that program a success. He has been a strong and out-spoken advocate for a program of dancing that would allow people to join our activity even though they could not keep up with our demanding schedules. In support of this "uncharted" approach he has served, with a lot of help from Judy, for many years as the editor of the CD Journal

He has continued as an advocate for this special part of our square dance activity long enough to see it become accepted by many of us as an important path for us to take into the future. The current acceptance of, and respect for, the beginner party as part of square dancing does not diminish the decades during which Cal pointed toward that path in near isolation. He and Judy ran the Beginner Dance Party Leaders Seminar (BDPLS) of which we are now justifiably proud, for several years with little recognition by CALLERLAB and virtually no support. For the past 5 years it has been a very well attended pre-convention program that we are pleased to identify as a CALLERLAB event.

While the BDPLS is the most recent and most visible of Cal's contributions to our activity, his dedication, willingness to work, commitment to our organization and to square dancing are huge. He has demonstrated the success potential of the kind of square dancing he urges us to offer. He has written very helpful books to teach us the skills he has demonstrated and his writings have been published in all of the major square dance publications.

It is my privilege to ask you to join me in recognizing the contributions that **Cal Campbell** has made to CALLERLAB, to square dancing and to you and me.

MILESTONE AWARD BETSY GOTTA Presented by John Kaltenthaler



he five categories that must be earned in order to receive the CALLERLAB Milestone Award are as follows:

Category 1. The Recipient must show outstanding and significant contribution to the field of square dancing. The individual must have shown leadership in uncharted fields, which has resulted in the betterment of Square Dancing.

Category 2. The contribution must have stood the test of time.

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Category 3. Relates to unselfish contribution, divorced from personal gain and monetary rewards. Requires attitudes that think of others first.

Category 4. The recipient must maintain and conduct self in professional leadership capacity, professionalism reflecting high standards of leadership to which we have dedicated ourselves in our day to day actions.

Category 5. The recipient must have exercised broad influence in the square dance activity although local geographic and highly specialized activity may lead to recognition.

Tonight's recipient began dancing in 1952. This caller is a second-generation caller. The recipient first attended a National Square Dance Convention (NSDC) in 1961 and hasn't missed one since then. This recipient called a first tip in 1957 at the Kentucky Dance Institute as a 10-year-old and was successful. After the tip this caller got off the stage and cried and said, "I'll never do that again" (So much for idle threats). This recipient's credentials include the following: Called at the 1963 NSDC and has called at every one since that time; has participated in clinics, panels and seminars for Legacy, CALLERLAB, and NSDC. In 2002 was honored in St Paul for calling the 40th consecutive NSDC. The recipient feels that all callers, especially the more popular and/or full time callers should try to call at as many NSDCs as possible to give back to the dancers some of the pleasure earned from them.

She joined CALLERLAB in 1974 and hasn't missed a convention since. Yes, I am talking about a woman caller. She is a CALLERLAB Accredited Caller-Coach. Her credits include the following: the first American woman to be elected to the Board of Governors and has been on the Board for twelve years. She serves on the following Committees within CALLERLAB: Women in Calling, Caller Training, Challenge, Contra, Youth, Caller-Coach and responds to mailings from others; responds to all of her E-mails from CALLERLAB. Just recently she has spent more than 250 hours editing the Best of CALLERLAB Tapes. This last item certainly shows her qualification in categories one and three (outstanding & unselfish contribution.)

She was a member of LEGACY from 1981 through 2002 when it ceased its existence. She served on the Legacy Executive Committee. She has been a member of ROUNDALAB since 1985 and a long time member of CONTRALAB and of the Lloyd Shaw Foundation. She served as Vice Chair Square Dance Programming for the NSDC in 2002. She calls all recognized dance programs from Contra thru C3B.

She has called for one club, Rutgers Promenaders, for more than thirty-six years, one of the founders of the Callers Council of New Jersey, a Charter member of the Square Dance Council of New Jersey, a Member of Northern New Jersey Round Dance Leaders Council, New Jersey Square Dance Council Convention, serving in the capacities as Education Chairman, Program Book Chairman, Registration Chairman, Program Chairman, Vice Chairman and General Chairman.

She has taught more than fifty sets of beginner classes as well as numerous Plus, Advanced and Challenge classes. Since her retirement from her day job she has started two Intro to Square Dance programs for senior groups. In 2001 she was recognized at the International Association of Gay Square Dancers Convention (IAGSDC) with the Golden Boot Award, the highest award given to one person in any one year. She received this award for her efforts to help bridge the gap between the gay and straight square dance communities.

In 1987 she became a partner in a venture to produce a Square Dance Video instruction with the following stipulations: They would not be home movies; A Professional producer, Director, Cameraman, Make-up Artist, Editor and Studio would be hired. (They were all hired at a cost of \$15,000 per video.) These videos would be designed as reference materials so as not to replace callers. Since becoming sole owner in 2002 she has deducted \$5.00 from the sale of each video as a donation to the CALLERLAB FOUNDATION

I truly believe that this recipient has more than met all of the requisite categories in her capacity over many years and is extremely well deserving of the 2006 Milestone Award.

It is my distinct honor and privilege to make this presentation to a most deserving person. Please join me now as we present, the coveted, Milestone Award to **BETSY GOTTA.**

GOLD CARD MEMBERSHIP

CALLERLAB Life (Gold Card) Membership may be given in recognition of service to CALLERLAB. It may be presented to long term CALLERLAB Members who have provided outstanding service to CALLERLAB and been selected by representatives of the membership to be honored in this way. The list of those who have been given this recognition is short. It includes people who have worked very hard - and very effectively - for CALLERLAB. This award is an actual gold metal card.

This organization has many ways of recognizing our members, and in some cases even non-members, for their contributions to the square dance activity. The Gold Card is reserved for those members who have worked to make CALLERLAB a more effective leadership organization. The service that our Gold Card members have given has come in many forms. Until this year, only nine CALLERLAB Members have been honored in this way: Bill Davis; Herb Egender; Cal Golden; Lee Helsel (deceased); Arnie Kronenberger (deceased); Bob Osgood (deceased); Bill Peters (deceased), Gloria Rios Roth; and, Bob Van Antwerp (deceased). At the 2006 CALLERLAB Convention in Charlotte, NC this year two more names were added to this impressive list. Martin Mallard and Jim Mayo were presented with GOLD CARDS identifying each as a Life (Gold Card) Member of CALLERLAB. CON-GRATULATIONS! Martin and Jim.

GOLD CARD PRESENTATION TO MARTIN MALLARD Presented by Jim Mayo

ALLERLAB has a very special membership category. It was created to recognize members who have served CALLERLAB in an outstanding way. When it was created it included a requirement that the recipient also have, for whatever reason, retired from active calling. That requirement was rescinded at one point but it is still an important consideration. The number of individuals that have been recognized in this way over the last thirty-five years is still quite small only nine. The list includes names that nearly all will recognize, Bob Osgood, Herb Egender, Bill Peters, Arnie Kronenberger, Bill Davis, Cal Golden, Gloria Rios Roth, Lee Helsel and Bob Van Antwerp. It is truly a select group whose contributions, although varied, all include contributions and dedication to this organization that have gone way beyond the usual.

It is my privilege, this evening, to add a new name to that very short list. He attended the very first convention in St. Louis in 1974 and, with but one exception when his doctor absolutely forbade him to attend, he has been a full-time attendee at every convention since. He is with us today but, before I name him and let you show your appreciation I want to list some of the work he has done for us.

He has served as Chairman of the Mainstream Committee and the Caller Coach Committee. He was elected to the Board of Governors in 1984 and served twenty years on the board. For eight of those he was elected by the Board members to serve on the Executive Committee. In that capacity he was one of those who steered CALLERLAB through the first change of Executive Directors and Home Office location. He was also on the Executive Committee when BMI and ASCAP knocked on the door of the modern square dance activity with a demand that we buy licenses. I shared both of those traumas on the EC and I can assure you all that none of the decisions was easy and they involved discussions long into the night.

In another month our Gold Card recipient will retire from most active calling. The BOG has recently had a discussion about recognizing callers who have been calling for clubs for fifty years. It was an interesting discussion but I have to tell you that I know of only one caller who has called fifty years for the same club. He and Terry started the club. It has danced in their home for the last decade or so and it is still alive and succeeding. It is with great pleasure that I announce the award of a CALLERLAB Gold Card membership for Martin Mallard.

PROGRAM POLICY INITIATIVE Dick Mazziotti, Chairman

he great philosopher, Mark Twain, said, "It were not best that we should all think alike; it is difference of opinion that makes horse-races."

At the CALLERLAB convention in Charlotte, response to the Program Policy Initiative (PPI) was resoundingly positive. Local callers, regional callers, and national and international callers all seemed to have something to contribute to the idea that the square dancing activity and tradition might be more than the Mainstream to Challenge programs currently in place.

Loosening the reins and experimenting outside the box with personal programs that respond to local needs seems to have lit a fire that could brighten the whole activity, including the traditional program and club structure.

The Home Office has set up a special E-mail address for you to share your ideas and trials. The Program Policy Committee is standing by to receive, present and promote those experimentals you are working with. Tell us what you are doing. We want to hear from you.

For example, we know there are several different kinds of accelerated teaching programs going on. We need to hear about them. Last year the ABC idea was promoted. After a year or mores trial, perhaps someone can tell us how it's working. Callers are starting to talk about adult dances where beverages other than water are served, where squares compete with each other. All these ideas are now sanctioned by the PPI. These are not replacements for the current Program structure; they are adjuncts to it, ways of broadening the appeal and reception of the square dance tradition.

Let's not waste our work. Individual efforts, however, are just that without overview or organization. We need to hear from you. Whether you are running a BLAST program, an "accelerated" program, multi-cycle, ABC or just have an idea that seems to work for you, we need to hear from you. You can send a special E-mail, telling us about your experiment, to: specialCALLERLAB@aol.com.

A response committee has been arranged within the PPC to review, arrange and present your new ideas. Note that we are interested in all callers' personal programs, not just CALLERLAB members. If you are a member of a local or regional caller organization, please extend a CALLERLAB invitation to non-members to join us in this exciting effort.

The following can be helpful as a guide to the type of information that might be useful:

- 1. Contact name and contact information (phone, email, etc)
- 2. Is this a destination program? (is the end result a group that will continue to dance together?)
- 3. Does it make use of CALLERLAB Program calls? If so, typically how many?
- 4. Is it an adult program? Mixed? Children?
- 5. In a typical session, how many people attend?
- 6. What is the timing (e.g., once a week? once a month? irregular?)
- 7. What type of dancing makes up your program? Squares? Rounds? Contras? Etc.?
- 8. Do dancers accumulate calls from session to session or is each session unique to itself?
- 9. When are new dancers fresh off the street able to join?
- 10. Just tell us, in your own terms, what might be unique about your program?

ACCREDITATION PROCEDURES REVISED

he Guidelines For The Caller Accreditation Program have been revised and the revised document dated March 7, 2006 is now available through the CALLERLAB office or on the CALLERLAB web site at the following URL:

Any square dance caller may seek CALLERLAB accreditation. Membership in CALLERLAB is not a requirement. Callers must be re-accredited every six years to maintain continuous accreditation.

A caller seeking accreditation must be accredited first as a General Caller. Once qualified as a General Caller, he/she may also opt to be accredited in any or all five specialty areas or "Categories.", These categories include: 1) Square Dance Party, 2) Rounds, 3) Contra, 4) Advanced Dancing, and 5) Challenge Dancing.

Accreditation is accomplished by obtaining the signatures of three CALLERLAB Members or Associate Members in good standing. The Member or Associate Member does not have to be accredited to sign an Accreditation Application. CALLERLAB Apprentice Members or Associate Licensees may not sign as accreditors.

icy for \$30 per year.

Affiliated organizations are expected to subscribe to the CALLERLAB Code of Ethics and otherwise support CALLERLAB policies and recommendations.

2005 FINANCE REPORT

he corporation ended the 2005 fiscal year (November 30, 2005) with total assets \$63,132.00 including cash assets of \$58,094.06. Our Profit/Loss statement shows a Net Income Gain of \$13,031.59. This gain was due to some extent to increased participation in Electronic Distribution of DIRECTION. Nearly half of our Members have agreed to receive DI-RECTION Electronically, thus reducing printing and mailing costs. Another factor was the reduction in Home Office staff. As a money saving measure, we have implemented a system for the Electronic Distribution of DIRECTION, The CD Journal, and the Electronic News Service. The Treasurer's Report will be filed and a copy of the report is attached to the minutes of the annual meeting.

WHEN RETURNING YOUR BALLOT

hen ballots are returned to the office, the outer envelope return address is verified and checked off voting mailing lists. Once this is done, the outer envelopes are then opened and the ballot envelope date stamped. We do not open the ballot envelope until a minimum of 100 ballots are received. Those are counted and tallied and we wait for more! So if you have been one of "those people" who do not put their name and address on the outer envelope you just wasted your vote. If you put only an address on the outer envelope and it is not the address we have on file we still can't verify a valid ballot. You loose again.

So, please remember when you submit your ballot, be sure to put the ballot envelope inside another envelope and address the outer envelope, including your name and return address (the address where you received the ballot). If this information is not on the outer envelope, your ballot will not be counted.

COMMITTEE CONVENTION REPORTS CALLER-COACH COMMITTEE

here were fifteen members of the Caller-Coach Committee in attendance in attendance in Charlotte. We approved a complaint procedure. We also will be working with The Caller Training Committee to make needed change on the Party Night technical supplement document. We had a thirty minute presentation by Jerry Story on the CRaMS. We agreed on all new formations being OK and will start including these in our caller syllabus's. We revised one section, reducing hours needed on the Caller-Coach Re-Accreditation application.

We presented Martin Mallard with his Caller-Coach Emeritus Certificate.

CHOREOGRAPHIC APPLICATIONS COMMITTEE

Dottie Welch, Chairman

uring the last year the CAC completed major revisions to the Mainstream and Plus Standard Application Booklets. These are now available through the home office. Agreement was reached by the committee on new Arrangement Charts for the ten old and seventeen new formations and on abbreviations for those twenty-seven formations. Seventeen callers attended the meeting of the Choreographic Applications Committee in Charlotte. After an update on the current status of the projects mentioned above, we discussed the merit of a future project. The idea is to compile information about sight and module resolution methods. This would include the classic procedure, at-home resolutions, resolving using the limited vocabulary of new dancers, elegant get-outs from snapshot FRA's, using sequence as the primary tool, and any other methods of reasonable merit. It was agreed that this idea is worth pursuing so application will be submitted to begin this project. In the hope that it will be approved, please begin thinking about possible submissions to this collection.

GRANT WRITING COMMITTEE REPORT Cinda Asp, Chairman

There are three possible paths for this committee or a combination of these:

- One is to provide assistance and support for anyone (with a similar mission) who is searching for funds. This might include preparing several tailored case statements and packets of needed information like the 501(c) letter that could be used by anyone. An example of this is the review help provided to the Wisconsin Square & Round Dance Convention as they applied for funding to the Tourism Director of Middleton, WI.
- Two is searching for and applying for grants which would also involve preparing a case statement and assurances. Initially, this involves large amounts of time to prepare. Very few have stepped forward to help with this.
- Three would be to hire a grant writer. This would require a point person to provide ideas, lots and lots of information, and someone who could acquire approvals and signatures. And there are no assurances that this would bring funding.

2. Mission of CALLERLAB

The mission uses the word "promote" and this is a "red flag" for funding requests. Asking for money could be interpreted as self promotion, securing caller jobs for the future, creating money-making possibilities for yourself.

Is it possible to have additional parts to the mission? Or to have specific goals listed, such as, introducing a healthy activity to all age levels. I need to do some more research on this, but I wanted to know if it were possible.

3. Is everyone comfortable with these ideas/approaches or do you have others?

Some of the angles or hooks that could be used when looking for funds:

- Introducing the aging baby boomers to this activity which provides physical, mental and social exercise
- Addressing the problem of childhood obesity
- Providing a lifetime recreational skill
- Increase tourism through conventions and festivals
- 4. What is the approval process through the organization? How long does it take? Who speaks for the organization?

I am very sorry to be so negative. The initial support work is very important and requires lots of preparation work and time. In addition to asking for guidance, I am asking for patience (and, maybe, some help).

PLUS COMMITTEE Skip Brown, Chairman

he Plus Committee met on Monday, April 10th with twenty callers in attendance, eighteen of whom were Committee Members.

The Definitions Committee has been requested to redefine the ending formation(s) of All 8 Spin the Top.

A review of responses received to the pre-Triennial Review survey was given. Of the one hundred fifty-one members surveyed, ninety-two responded. Sixty-nine of those indicated they desired no change, twenty-three indicated some form of change. Fifty-nine members did not respond.

Several requests were received for one or two calls to be added to the Program. Only one of these was submitted with the required "pro" rationale. Therefore, the call "Triple Scoot" will be on the Triennial Ballot for possible addition to the Plus Program. The other calls (which will be listed on the ballot but will not be eligible for addition) are: Half Breed Thru, Interlocking Diamonds, Motivate, Remake the Thar, Rotary Spin, and the "Tag" family (all Tags).

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Several calls received one or two requests to be dropped from the Program, none of which were submitted with the required "Pro" rationale and are thus are ineligible to be considered for dropping at this time but will be listed on the ballot. Those calls are: Acey Deucy, Explode the Wave, Fan the Top, Peel Off, and Single Circle to a Wave. Of the twenty-three callers advocating some change, four of them recommended dropping one of the following calls: Spin Chain Thru, Spin Chain the Gears or Spin Chain and Exchange the Gears. An additional twelve of the twenty-three callers specifically advocated dropping Spin Chain Thru. The required "Pro" rationale was provided. Therefore the calls Spin Chain Thru, Spin Chain the Gears, and Spin Chain and Exchange the Gears will be on the Triennial Ballot for possible deletion from the Plus Program.

A question was raised on the wording of the definition of Spin Chain and Exchange the Gears and will be referred to the Definitions Committee for resolution.

The timing of Tag the Line was determined in a Joint Mainstream/Plus session on Monday afternoon as follows: If preceded by a Pass Thru the timing was seven steps; with no Pass Thru the timing was five steps.

RPM COMMITTEE Tom Rudebock, Chair

iscussion was held on the implementation of the Marketing Plan and the development of a Logo, Slogan and Website. Mailings will be made to the committee asking for input in these areas and to build a database of callers and partners with skills in needed areas including research, editing, graphic arts and design. As the implementation develops, reports will be made through DIRECTION and news releases.

There was also discussion on ways to recruit new callers and CALLERLAB members, ways to better promote CALLERLAB among callers, partners, and dancers and ways to keep current members and partners motivated.

NOT YOUR DADDY'S SQUARE DANCING Jerry Maurice

he square dance caller steps up to the microphone, turns on his high-powered computer, and selects the music for the next series of songs he will use in the dance. He selects the modern and contemporary "A Lover's Concerto" by Sarah Vaughan for his patter selection - the first part of a two-song set called the "tip" - because it's well known and will get the people in a dancing mood. For the second song he uses the crowd-pleasing, soft-rock "Piano Man" by Billy Joel. He will balance the rest of the evening with a wide variety of music, that might include contemporary, folk, modern, country, rock, big band, swing, Latin, Americana, patriotic . . . and, yes, even rap, if he thinks the people want to dance to that sound. For he knows that square dancers come in all ages and from all walks of life, and have wide-ranging tastes in music.

To illustrate this, let's take a look at the front square, the four couples who are dancing at the front of the hall near the square dance caller:

Couple number one, Donna and Jerry, started dancing in their late twenties. Jerry is a regional sales manager for a company in California and Donna is an aerobic instructor. They have been square and round dancing for twenty-eight years.

Couple number two: Tony and Dot, late forties, just recently came back to square dancing after their two children finished school. Tony is a computer technician and travels the country for his company trouble-shooting complex computer problems, and Dot is a former nurse who now works in the education field.

Couple number three, Scott and Diane, about thirty, are brand new, first year dancers. They got tired of doing nothing and started taking square dance les-

sons. They found out how much fun and exercise they can have together as a couple by square dancing and now can't seem to get enough.

Couple number four isn't really a couple, they just dance together. They are Betty and Mona, two ladies who don't have permanent dancing partners, so they team up together and dance so they can enjoy the good fun and social atmosphere of the square and round dance.

As you can see from this typical square, you find a wide variety of people from all sorts of professions and age groups in square dancing. There are no barriers. Everyone mixes together to dance and have a good time.

The dress at a square dance varies, and the dress code today is greatly relaxed. Though boots and cowboy hats are no longer expected as standard wear in modern square dancing, the Western style, with the ladies in full hoop skirts, is still common. The men wear long sleeve shirts, relaxed dress pants, slacks, or even jeans. The ladies often wear a prairie skirt, pant suit, modern dress, or dress jeans, which are becoming more common. The key is to wear whatever makes you comfortable, with the only guideline being to dress neat and respectable.

Most everyone wears a name badge, as a courtesy, so that it's easy to learn other people's names. Courtesy, in fact, is a major part of the square and round dance. There is no competition at any level. It takes eight people, four couples per square, working together, to succeed in the dance. I think it may well be because of this courteous, team-building nature of the activity, that square dancers tends to be friendly people who build lasting relationships and strong friendships.

Today's square dancing is not the dancing you may have done in grammar school. *It's not your Daddy's square dancing*. Instead of sitting home watching TV or playing with their computers, today's square and round dancers are out getting both physical and mental exercise, while socializing with other fun-loving people. So if there's stress in your life, or if you're not getting enough physical exercise or mental stimulation, you might want to give square dancing a try. It costs much less then a night at the movies or dinner out, and it's a great wholesome, fun-filled social activity you can do with your significant other or by yourself.

NOTE: Round dancing, the counterpart of square dancing, is similar to Ballroom dancing, and the two types of dancing are frequently done alternately during a dance. For more information go to www.dosado.com Click on Clubs to find the closest dance group.

- Category 3. Relates to unselfish contribution, divorced from personal gain and monetary rewards. Requires attitudes that think of others first.
- Category 4. The recipient must maintain and conduct self in professional leadership capacity, professionalism reflecting high standards of leadership to which we have dedicated ourselves in our day to day actions.
- Category 5. The recipient must have exercised broad influence in the Square Dance Activity although local geographic and highly specialized activity may lead to recognition.
